

I became acquainted with her at our April meeting where she was sitting front and center and mentioned she was one of two Artistic Design Show division chairs for the 2014 American Hosta Society **National** Convention in Cedar Rapids. Yes, that's Peggy next to Mike Shadrack, Vice President of Awards and Honors of the American Hosta Society accepting the Best Artistic Design Award (Potter Bob's original vase) which our club sponsors each year at the convention.

Would you be surprised if I told you that *Hosta* 'Pandora's Box' stole Peggy's heart? It was love at first sight, but the sight of the price, \$25.00 (some years ago), was almost too much! You have to be careful. You have to have the right material and container to come out the winner." She further noted that tropical materials hold up well as they can go without water and retain their crisp, fresh look for most of a show.

When asked about the competition for the AHS Artistic Design show, she noted that of the 12-15 entrants in the category, she was surprised to have won because all the designs were very creative. Her winning design was entitled: 'The Sky's the Limit'. The hosta leaves represented the launch pad and the iris represented rockets taking off. Entries in the category were judged on the design itself, conformance, distinction, artistic concept and expression. I think the judges were spot on. **Congratulations**, **Peggy!**

Be on the lookout for Peggy at the fall meeting. If you see her, introduce yourself and congratulate her on her award. And remember to wear a green t-shirt to the meeting.

ROHS Spring Meeting

Neal Smith National Wildlife Refuge April 13, 2014

Lee Coates of Lee's Trees and Peggy's Flowers was our guest speaker. He managed to put us into a fairy tale wonderland with miniature gardening while educating us on the care of Japanese Maples.

Japanese Maples can thrive in Iowa in full sun to part shade. They need the soil to be kept moist and mulched for their shallow root system. Protect them from the drying winter wind and they do best on the SE side of your house. The more sun they receive, the brighter the color. They like decaying mulch, grass clippings, and oak bark for the mulch.

Lee had several Japanese Maples for sale in various sizes along with his papercrete containers, companion plants, and accessories for fairy gardening. Those in attendance managed to help lighten his load back to the Ozarks on a soggy day.

Business Meeting:

Eve Vanden Broek called the meeting to order. She thanked Linda Baer for bringing the main dish and drinks for our meeting, hauling everything in the pouring rain. Eve added color to our room with Pansies for the table decorations that were given away at the end of the event.

Attendees were asked to fill out the questionnaires on the tables so that the officers could use that information for future meetings. Officer Reports

Unfinished Business/Projects

Phase 2 will include a Hosta Garden. There are 5 Russ O'Harra hostas that Mel does not have: 'Clair De Lune', 'Elizabeth Levy', 'Pearl Buttons' and 'Spit Shine'. David Dettmann will continue to act as our liaison keeping in contact with Mel and updating the group as needed.

Iowa Arboretum Joe McNally reported that the Hosta garden will not move from its current location. We are still waiting to hear from the Arboretum as to what we as a group can do to help.
